Welcome to the Gaspé Peninsula! Bienvenue to our gorgeous vacation destination! The Gaspésie or Gaspé Peninsula, (pronounced Gaspay-zee or Gaspay) is an area of eastern Quebec. It is best enjoyed by car, camper, motorcycle and it is a bicyclist's dream.

The Gaspé is a vast and unspoiled area; one bursting with beauty at every bend in the road. Highway 132 begins in Ste-Flavie at the north end of the peninsula, and circumvents the entire coast. This trip around the perimeter of the peninsula is 900 kilometres in length. But don't hurry along; savour the stunning scenery on this grand peninsula. It is just 560 kilometres east of Montreal, 350 kilometres east of Quebec City, 1100 kilometres east of Toronto, just north of New Brunswick, 4 hours by car from Maine and worth the drive!

Every year thousands of visitors journey here in search of the uncrowded, uncluttered and uncommercialized vacation experience. No place ever feels overcrowded. If there is something we have loads of, it is space. The vistas you see will include water, mountains, and forests. Our predominant colours are blue and green but so much more than that too. Azure, teal, slate, agua, robin's egg, navy, indigo and more can more accurately describe our skies and water. The fields and forests will amaze you with their rich colours; including emerald, jade, kelly, lime, moss, olive and sage.

The middle of the peninsula, the 'spine', is part of the Appalachian Mountain Range which dips into the sea at the eastern tip of the Peninsula. Here the mountains are known as the Chic-Chocs. Abundant, unspoiled beaches - the saltwater of the Bay of Chaleur or the Gulf of St. Lawrence and pristine waters of the many rivers and lakes await you.

Lovely old homes can still be seen; examples of a bygone era. You will see homes that are painted in bright and cheery colours. In the warmer months you will see laundry flapping on the line. This in itself is a beautiful sight of a bygone era. Mountains, heritage homes, majestic and historic churches, guaint little towns and villages, clean air and water and a slower tempo - it all can be found here.

This year plan to travel to a destination right here in Canada that you may have overlooked. You will not have to lose money when exchanging to a foreign currency! You can experience the French and English flavour that has existed here for over 200 years. You will see a kaleidoscope of landscapes so do not forget your camera. You will treasure those photos which will remind you of an absolutely exquisite off the beaten path region. Come. You will be glad that you did.



You have made a decision to come to the beautiful Gaspé for a vacation. Great decision. It's time to pack your suitcase or knapsack! Here are a few suggestions and tips.

Springtime is relatively short on the Gaspé due to its late arrival in May. Summer weather can be variable and the temperature in the summer is often influenced by the direction of the wind. West wind brings clear, mild air. The east wind blowing off the Labrador Current brings cold and rainy weather. Winds can change direction quickly, so if you are hiking or on the water pack a waterproof and windproof jacket. Autumn on the Gaspé can be surprisingly sunny and warm, so pack layers of clothing. You might find walking poles helpful for navigating rocky beaches, steep hills or mountains.

If you want to observe birds and whales remember to pack binoculars. If you wish to hike bring along a knapsack, high energy food, a water bottle, a compass, and insect repellent. When travelling it is always a good idea to pack a first aid kit. Life vests are included when renting kayaks and canoes.

You may want to visit the Jardins de Metis. Here you will be awed by the splendour of over 1,000 varieties of plants including azaleas, rhododendrons and the rare and unusual, Himalayan Blue Poppy.

Treat yourself to the fresh farm products that are available throughout the Gaspé region: fresh fruit, vegetables, cheese, jams and pies, maple syrup and honey. There are countless places for enjoying an outdoor meal. Visit the beaches and the harbours of the Gaspé - some of which are still being used today. Pack a picnic lunch or get some take-out food to enjoy at a leisurely pace. Did you remember to pack a blanket to throw on a grassy patch or even on the sand?

A little off the beaten track on Route 299, which follows the beautiful, world class Cascapedia River, is the majority English-speaking village of Cascapedia-St-Jules. Unpack those comfortable walking shoes because today you may be visiting the cliffs at the Parc de Miguasha where some of North America's oldest fossils have been discovered. This includes '*Eusthenopteron foordi*,' a cross between a fish and amphibians that dates back 350 million years!

Don't forget to use the binoculars you stashed in your bag to scan the waters of the Bay and Gulf to spot a whale or even a seal basking on a rock on a sunny day. If you are the adventurous type visit Cime Aventure in Bonaventure and rent a kayak or canoe. All Cime Aventure tours include basic instruction in paddling techniques and safety tips as well as the equipment needed to enjoy these activities. Casual clothing will be required for all sorts of outdoor activities.

A fascinating view of the history of the Gaspésie can be enjoyed at the Gaspesian British Heritage Village, New Richmond. This impressive site showcases the history and culture of Gaspesians of British ancestry and their contribution to the development of the Gaspé Coast. The village recounts the history of these settlers from the 1760's to the early 1900's. An interpretation centre, hiking trails, beach and playground will round out your visit. Be certain to bring along your bathing suit and a towel to fully enjoy the day.

Many campgrounds are available, so choose a spot and settle down for a while in order to enjoy the peace and quiet found on the Gaspésie. A very unique resort, Gite du Mont-Albert in the Parc de la Gaspésie, offers incredible cuisine. Advance reservations for the restaurant and/or accommodations are required.

On a misty morning you might enjoy a leisurely stroll near the estuary of the Bonaventure River. This beautiful and ecologically varied area is part of the 22 areas that are protected areas by the Quebec Department of Environment and Sustainable Development.

These 22 areas add up to 135,626 square kilometers of Quebec which is protected territory. It represents slightly more than 8% of the province's surface and it is protected against industrial development. That is a good thing because Gaspésie's natural, unspoiled beauty is her strength and appeal.

The part of the Bonaventure River estuary that is now officially protected covers 1.8 sq kms. It is one of the 10 genuine estuary barachois in Quebec. The area is characterized by rich wildlife and vegetation, influenced by a mix of fresh and sea water.

Approximately 240 bird species can be observed in the vicinity and it's also one of the richest spawning grounds for smelt. The protection granted to the Bonaventure estuary is permanent.

But there is so much more unspoiled beauty for you to savour! Keep travelling and keep your eyes open for more of the same!

All of these are just the beginning of the photographer's wonderland here on the Gaspé Peninsula.

Did you know

According to the National Geographic Society the Gaspé Peninsula is ranked as the third must-see destination in the world with a score of 80%. There's reason enough to visit right there! Who can argue with National Geographic?

The Gaspé is divided into five geographic regions: The Coast, The Upper Gaspésie, Land's End, Chaleur Bay and The Valley.

There are over 2,000 kilometres of snowmobile trails on the Gaspé.

Mont Jacques Cartier is the highest point on the peninsula at 1268 metres.

Speaking of Jacques Cartier, the explorer visited the Gaspé in 1534.

Gaspé's most populated town is...Gaspé, with approximately 15,000 inhabitants. The next most populous towns are Chandler, Ste-Anne-des-Monts, Caleton-sur-Mer, New Richmond, Perce, Grande-Riviere, Paspébiac and Cap-Chat.

The mining of copper ore began in Murdochville in 1955.

The Gaspé Peninsula is 270 kilometres long.

In the years 1816 and 1817 a great and devastating famine struck the Gaspé Coast.

The railway from Matapedia to Gaspé was completed in 1911.

The Bay of Chaleur is designated as an official member of 'The Most Beautiful Bays in the World Club.'

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Gaspé is an absolutely spellbinding destination - actually breathtaking! The Gaspé is Quebec's pudgy thumb of land cocked eternally towards Europe. The name comes from the MicMac Indian word gespec, "where the land ends."

The MicMac Indians settled here at least 8,000 years ago, long before jacques Cartier claimed the Gaspé for France in 1534.

Later, with immigration actively supported by the French Crown, seigneuries or land grants were made with the obligation of preparing the land for new immigrants and agriculture.

An early Acadian community was established at the mouth of the Bonaventure River because their ships could anchor in the natural,

deepwater harbour without being seen from the sea. They constructed their homes in the woods near their farms and also built seaside cabins for summer fishing. Other Acadian communities were founded at Tracadigache (Carleton), Cascapedia and Paspébiac where they farmed, fished and established a logging industry based on the demand for red pine masts in Europe and the Caribbean.

Fishermen from the Channel Islands were among the earliest Europeans to visit North American offshore waters. Some believe that they crossed the Atlantic long before Columbus' voyages and that it was on their recommendation that Cabot sailed for Newfoundland in 1497. By the end of the 17th. Century, jersey merchants had established a lucrative triangular trade between New England/ Newfoundland, the Caribbean and Europe. Charles Robin, a jersey merchant, set up a fishing post at Paspébiac in 1767 after Canada passed to the English. Other fishing posts were set up along the Gaspé Coast and the Charles Robin Co. was instrumental in bringing jersey families to settle at Paspébiac, Port Daniel, Grande-Riviere, Perce, Gaspé and Grande Grave.

Coinciding with Charles Robin's return to Gaspésie was the influx of Loyalists from the American colonies. The greatest Loyalist immigration to Canada took place after the war ended in 1783. Loyalist groups established farming communities at New Carlisle, New Richmond and Douglastown. They were joined by waves of new immigrants in the 1840s when potato crops failed in Ireland and Scotland.

Early Gaspesians were geographically and culturally isolated and still today, a hodgepodge of accents, languages and customs characterize the peninsula.

When you visit the Gaspé Peninsula you will want to bring along your camera because there will be unlimited opportunities to shoot some award winning photographs. You could be snapping pictures all day...and night! There is so much here on the Gaspé Peninsula that will wow you. On your journey you are sure to be awed by the picturesque valleys, sea and mountain landscapes, forests, bays and coastlines.

You must take at least a few photos of, arguably, one of the best known icons in North America – Percé Rock! Be assured you will find plenty more to inspire you. Perch yourself on a driftwood log on the beach and wait. Sooner or later something will motivate you. You see the water here has moods. One day it is tranquil and peaceful. The next day it may be gray and angry. The waters are changing constantly. Watch for the changing views. Don't ignore the vistas of the majestic mountains or the lovely solitude of an icy cold stream which flows down from those mountains. Many birds can be spotted here on the Gaspé, including interesting varieties of shore and water birds. If you enjoy bird watching bring along a birdwatchers guidebook.

PERCÉ

The Gaspé offers spectacular sunsets and also prospects for night-time photography. Opportunities abound for the up- close photographer - wild lupines, daisies, shells, beach rocks. All of these are just the beginning of the photographer's wonderland here on the Gaspé Peninsula.

Of all the animals that have lived on our planet, the blue whale is, without a doubt, the biggest. Because an average blue whale measures 27 meters in length and weighs 100 metric tons, even the most gigantic dinosaurs from Jurassic could not take the title away from them. To date, the biggest known blue whale measured 33.2 meters and weighed approximately more than 145 tons.

The blue whale is found in Gaspé due to the abundance of food in the water around the peninsula, particularly in the Gaspé Bay. This mammal looks for aggregations of krill, a small crustacean that resembles a shrimp, and will gulp it down in just one bite with its enormous mouth. Its numerous whalebones allow it to filter seawater and keep only the food it will swallow later on.

However, the survival of this animal is in a very precarious state. Whaling, an activity man has engaged in for several decades, has constituted a serious threat to the species. Until May 3, 2002, the blue whale was considered a species of special concern. However, COSEWIC, the Committee on the Status of Endangered Wildlife in Canada, has since changed the status to endangered. Thus, the blue whale has now reached the highest level of concern, and joins the belugas of St. Lawrence when it comes to their urgent need of protection.

Because this whale is no longer hunted, its biggest threats are collisions with ships, disturbances caused by the disrespectful observation of whales, entanglements of fishing gear and pollution.

"Les Graves" trail at Forillon National Park offers a breathtaking view of Gaspé Bay as well as the chance to watch these giants of the oceans and other whales come to eat. Those who wish to observe them from the sea can also take whale-watching cruises.

Shigawake is a farming and fishing community, settled in the 1800s by mostly Irish and Scottish people. To this day the majority of its residents are English-speaking, living in harmony with their francophone neighbours cultivating the land and harvesting the sea.

This lovely little pastoral village gets its name from the Micmac Chigouac, meaning "land of the rising sun". Indeed, the sun rises right out of Chaleur Bay here, turning the local sandstone cliffs a brilliant red.

At our tourist stop you will find families enjoying themselves playing baseball and volleyball. You can take advantage of our no service camping area. You will also appreciate strolling the footpaths through a beautiful cedar woods with lookouts on the Baie des Chaleurs & Fisherman's Wharf with picnic tables and benches. Enjoy our walking trail to the Shigawake waterfalls with picnic tables along the way.

To fully sayour the peninsula, you will want to spend at least a week here. Each little town is unique and every curve in the road offers a brand new vista to enjoy.

You might see drifts of lupines along the road in Shigawake, Indian Head Rock just north of Percé, a magnificent church in St. Siméon, the still bustling wharf in Paspébiac and an agate beach at Coin du Banc. The treasures of the Gaspésie are many.

You may choose to visit the Jardins de Metis. Here you will be awed by the splendour of over 1,000 varieties of plants including azaleas, rhododendrons and the rare and unusual, Himalayan Blue Poppy.

Treat yourself to the fresh farm products that are available throughout the Gaspé region: fresh fruit, vegetables, cheese, jams and pies, and honey. There are countless places for enjoying an outdoor meal. Visit the beaches and the harbours of the Gaspé - some of which are still being used today. Pack a picnic lunch or get some take-out food to enjoy at a leisurely pace.

Visit the cliffs at the Parc de Miguasha where some of North America's oldest fossils have been discovered. This includes 'Eusthenopteron foordi,' a cross between a fish and amphibians that is about 350 million years old!

Don't forget to scan the waters of the Bay and Gulf to spot a whale or even a seal basking on a rock on a sunny day. If you are the adventurous type visit Cime Aventure in Bonaventure and rent a kayak or canoe. All Cime Aventure tours include basic instruction in paddling techniques and safety tips as well as the equipment needed to enjoy these activities.

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Interpretation centér

The Bourg de Pabos Interpretation Centre is the recipient of two architectural awards (1994). A visit to the centre will make you better understand the New France Gaspesian fishermen's way of life. The archaeological remains of the Pabos seigneury sustain its historical aspect. **Open from June 8** to September 19

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Camping Québec classified the Pabos campground as a three star campsite. Vacationers will enjoy a peaceful and quiet environment.

PERCÉ



A place to unwind! Percé invites you to discover the richness of its heritage, as well as a region immensely favored by nature's generosity. From Prével to Cap d'Espoir, activities abound throughout summer!

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The rock

No Gaspesian summer would be complete without at least one visit to Perce. All visitors and residents of the peninsula should deny themselves this pleasure. There is so much to do there. You are guaranteed to have a lovely, memorable day. Take a boat cruise to Bonaventure Island, around Perce Rock or whale watching. The shops are quaint with a variety of interesting goods, including jewellery, art and other souvenirs. A wide choice of restaurants is available from sandwich shops to finer dining. If you are the active sort you might wish to climb up to the lookout. There is deep sea fishing, sea kayaks, scuba diving, walking trails, bird watching and more. Perce Rock itself is one of the largest and most spectacular natural arches found anywhere. Perce Rock is a massive limestone stack which is approximately 450 metres long, 90 metres wide and 90 metres at its highest point. There were, at one time, two arches in the rock until the outer arch collapsed in 1845.

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Don't forget to visit

L'ANSE-AU-GRIFFON, CAP-DES-ROSIERS AND FORILLON PARK

In L'Anse-au-Griffon you must see Le Manoir Le Boutillier which was built in 1840 by an immigrant from Jersey, John LeBoutiller who was one of the most successful fish merchants of the time. It is a museum, boutique and has a café.

In Cap-des-Rosiers, on the tip of Forillon, there stands Canada's tallest lighthouse at app. 35 metres which was built in 1858. It is classified as a National Historic Site and is on top of a steep cliff. We took loads of photos and it was a foggy morning so it set the mood perfectly. Samuel de Champlain noted the settlement on a map in 1632. In 1847 the shipwreck of the Carrick occurred here and more than 130 Irish immigrants perished. The survivors of that tragedy settled in this area.

In 1970 the Government of Quebec, following an agreement with the Federal government for the creation of Park Forillon, expropriated a part of Cap de Rosiers thereby evicting families of fish-

juts out into the sea and it is officially the end of the Appalachian Mountains. National Geographic identified the Gaspé as one of the top destinations in the world!

Forillon National Park is a peninsula which

At Forillon Park the scenery is breath-taking. Don't forget to visit the Heritage Site and the Interpretation Centre there are large aquariums and exhibits.

Rosiers thereby evicting families of ermen who had lived there for generations. This remains a controversial decision and rightly so.

POINTE-À-LA-CROIX

(highway 132) Battle of the Restigouche National Historic Site. This national historic site commemorates the 1760 naval battle that was to mark the end of New France. In July 1760, the British destroyed a French rescue fleet at the mouth of the Restigouche River. This event spelled the loss of all hope of saving New France. • Pointe-a-la-Croix: 418-788-5676

MIGUASHA

The palaeontological site of Miguasha National Park, in south-eastern Quebec on the southern coast of the Gaspé peninsula, is considered to be the world's most outstanding illustration of the Devonian Period known as the 'Age of Fishes'. Dating from 370 million years ago, the Upper Devonian Escuminac Formation (UNESCO) represented here contains five of the six fossil fish groups associated with this period. Miguasha Park conserves a fossil rich cliff with a worldwide reputation. • Nouvelle: 418-794-2475.

MARIA

Gesgapegiag is located at the 7th district of the old Mic-Mac Nation. Point of interest is the unique WigWam church built in 1960.

NEW RICHMOND

Visit The Gaspesian British Heritage Village. Located on 82 acres of field and woodland, the Village offers a peaceful trip through time with 24 historic buildings brought to life by local artisans, historic figures and community members. A historical village where we get a glimpse of English lifestyle back in the 19th century. • New Richmond: 418-392-4487.

BONAVENTURE

Visit the Bioparc de la Gaspésie and discover different species of wildlife of the Gaspé living in five ecosystems through a one km walk path. • Bioparc de la Gaspésie: 418-534-1997

Visit the Musée Acadien du Québec during the summer season, step back in history while visiting their exhibits. • Musée Acadien du Québec: 418 534-4000

NEW CARLISLE

This town is the birthplace of former Quebec Premier, René Levesque. Visit his life-size statue in the Municipal Park. New Carlisle boasts a harmonious mix of both French and English cultures. Take the Heritage Tour through the town where you will see such stately homes as the Hamilton House built in 1852 by Quebec legislative assembly member John-Robinson Hamilton. Behind the Hamilton House is the Caldwell House, the oldest home in New Carlisle. The new Kempffer Cultural Interpretation Centre opened its doors to the public in the spring of 2008, following a half-million dollar makeover spearheaded by local heritage enthusiasts. The house was built in 1868 by Loyalist descendants Robert Kempffer Jr. and his wife Sara Jane Langler. New this year along the boardwalk, near the harbour, the sculpture "Visage des Chaleurs." 418-752-3141

PASPÉBIAC

In 1767 Charles Robin, from the Island of Jersey, chose this location to establish the headquarters of his cod fishing empire. Eleven buildings erected in 1783 make up the Historical Site (Site Historique du Banc-de-Pêche-de-Paspébiac) on the beach. • Paspébiac: 418-752-6229

PORT DANIEL

Visit the new interpretation center in the Maison LeGrand. • Port Daniel: 418-396-5225

PABOS

The Parc du Bourg de Pabos: A guided visit at the Interpretation Centre allows a better understanding of the life of the Gaspesian fishers under a seigniory established under the French regime. The Quebec government, in partnership with the Base de plein air de Bellefeuille, is investing \$743,654 over the next two years to overhaul and renovate this important regional complex. • Pabos Mills: 418-689-6043.





PERCÉ - BONAVENTURE ISLANDS

Percé Rock is one of the most important natural tourist attractions in Quebec. All who have seen it have been impressed by its size, its colour and its beauty. Because of the many belvederes (Mt. Joli, Mt. Ste-Anne and Pic de l'Aurore, just to name a few) situated here and there, the Rock can be viewed from many angles.

Percé was one of the first permanent settlements for Europeans in the 1600s. The famous Percé Rock and Bonaventure Island with its thousands of gannets are sights that you will never forget.

FORT PRÉVEL

Built in 1939 The Fort Prével gun battery was one of the defense facilities built by the Canadian Department of Defense during World War II to protect the St. Lawrence River from German U-Boat attacks. From 1941 on, the naval and aviation base built in Gaspé was protected by military facilities overlooking both shores of Gaspé Bay, from Péninsula on the north shore to Prével on the south shore. Two giant guns were installed at Fort Prével, the biggest in their class in North America and able to launch very high caliber short-range rounds.

GASPÉ

We are only 30 km from Forillon National Park. Gaspé contains three world-class salmon fishing rivers.

Gaspé Museum:Year-round, the museum presents a program that highlights various aspects of Gaspesian culture. In addition to the exhibits, you will also find a shop, an archives centre, a library specialized in Gaspesian history and genealogy, a cultural magazine (the Magazine Gaspésie), an outdoor amphitheater and the Monument à Jacques Cartier. L'ANSE-AU-GRIFFON

Le Manoir LeBoutillier built in 1840 by Jersey immigrant John Leboutillier, was one of the biggest Jersey fish merchants of that time. The Manoir Le Boutillier has been turned into a museum, handicraft boutique and cafe. • Le Manoir Le Boutillier, L'Anse-au-Griffon: 418-892-5150.

FORILLON NATIONAL PARK

Forillon is one of the most stunning federal parks in all of Canada. You can hike, cycle, ride, kayak, go whale-watching, and swim in the park's heated pool.
